

**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SHIPLAKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN SHIPLAKE  
MEMORIAL HALL  
ON TUESDAY MARCH 22<sup>nd</sup> 2016 AT 7.45 P.M.**

**1. PRESENT:** Mr T Taylor(Chair), Mr G Thomas, Mr R Head, Mr D Pheasant, Mr R Curtis, Mr M Leonard, Mr D Bartholomew(OCC) and Mr P Harrison (DC) **APOLOGIES.** Mr G Davies, Mr C Smith and Mr F Maroudas sent their apologies

**2. DECLARATIONS OF GIFTS & INTEREST.** Councillors were given the opportunity to declare any gifts or interest in any item on the Agenda. Mr Curtis declared an interest in PA for Grays Lodge.

**3. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY FEBRUARY 8<sup>TH</sup> 2016** were approved on a motion proposed by Mr G Thomas and seconded by Mr R Curtis.

**4. MATTERS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETINGS**

1. The Chairman expressed his congratulations on behalf of the Council to Mr R Head upon receiving his High Sheriffs Award for Community Service

2. SOHA meeting Chairman updated Council on latest outline developments. Mr R Head suggested Council contact SOHA and point out their latest plans do not seem to have identified sufficient parking spaces. The Chairman said he would contact Mr S Lynch ACTION: Mr T Taylor.

3. Mr G Thomas identified that some of the Councils Contact numbers have changed and need to be incorporated into Emergency Plan ACTION: Clerk

**1. BUDGET**

Prior to Christmas, Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) went out to consultation on possible additional budget cuts totalling £51m, at the time believed to be the worst-case scenario. However, due to a change in the funding formula, which penalised shire counties, the settlement was even worse than expected and the additional savings required now total £69m. In response to protests from shire counties, on 11th February the Government announced transitional funding and OCC will receive £9m across two financial years in respect of this.

The Council met on Tuesday 16th February to debate the budget measures necessary to achieve the savings. Although most of the savings will still go ahead, a cross-party agreement was made on the day incorporating the following changes:

- A total of £2m of savings relating to Early Intervention Hubs and Children's Centres will now not take place. An original £6m saving on Early Intervention Hubs and Children's Centres - agreed by the council at its annual budget meeting in February 2015 - will still take place. No decisions have been taken at this stage on how this £2m will be spent.
- A total of £3m of savings relating to day centres (including transport to day centres) will now not take place. Instead they will be replaced by a saving of £1m from 2017/18 resulting from a full review of all day services for older people.
- There will be a further £300,000 contribution to the budget from reserves.

The net result of this is that the council will be able to set a balanced budget in 2016/17 but over the medium term now has £15.2m of unidentified savings to make as opposed to the previous figure of £11.2m. The new £4m of unidentified savings all fall in 2017/18.

A number of other important decisions were made during the debate:

- A cross-party board of county councillors will be created to consider how best to use the transitional funds.
- The council will consider workplace parking charging with a view to early implementation.
- There will be a review of the number of Cabinet members.

- The benefits of a Unitary Council will be discussed on a cross-party basis and full and timetabled consultation will be prepared. This will be subject a free vote for all councillors.

## **2. PROPOSALS FOR DISTRICT UNITARY COUNCILS**

On Thursday 25th February a surprise announcement was made by Oxfordshire's District Councils and Oxford City Council. (This may have been in response to OCC's call for a debate on a single Unitary Council for the county.) It called for the abolition of OCC and the establishment of four district unitaries:

- A new Southern Oxfordshire Unitary Authority would cover the area currently administered by Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire District Councils.
- An Oxford City Unitary Authority would be formed in the centre of the county, covering the area currently administered by Oxford City Council.
- A West Oxfordshire-Cotswold Unitary Authority covering the area currently administered by West Oxfordshire District Council and Cotswold District Council.
- A Cherwell-South Northants Unitary Authority covering the area currently administered by Cherwell District Council and South Northamptonshire Council.

OCC welcomes the District Councils' engagement in the Unitary debate and will shortly be putting forward its own proposals.

Mr D Bartholomew expressed his personal anger at the apparent management consultant costs when budgets were so tight and requested that Council write expressing their concern to Henley Standard and local chairs of interested authorities. ACTION: MR T Taylor

## **3. MAJOR INCIDENT AT DIDCOT POWER STATION**

There was a partial building collapse of Didcot A Power Station on Tuesday 23rd February and a major incident was declared. The multi-agency rescue operation continued over the weekend of 27th/28th February with emergency services cooperating with structural engineers and demolition experts. The partially collapsed building remained unstable making it a complex operation. At the time of writing (February 29th), there was one fatality, three people missing and five injured. Updates are posted regularly on the OCC website.

## **4. VILLAGE RESILIENCE FUND**

Oxfordshire communities are being urged to tap into a special 'resilience' fund to help them to cope better with emergencies. The SSE (Scottish and Southern Energy) Resilient Communities Fund offers up to £20,000 to help communities to:

- Protect the welfare of vulnerable people during a major power cut or emergency due to severe weather.
- Enhance community facilities and services that may be needed during a major power cut or emergency due to severe weather.
- Improve communication during an emergency situation, to keep communities informed or to aid contact between local groups and response services

## **5. THIRD READING BRIDGE**

Various Berkshire councils and enterprise groups have been campaigning vigorously in recent years for a new Thames crossing known as the 'Third Reading Bridge'. The bridge would link the end of the A329(M) in Berkshire to Playhatch in Oxfordshire. The enthusiasm of the scheme promoters is not shared by many Oxfordshire residents who are concerned about the large amount of extra traffic that would be deposited on to already congested rural roads. Historically, both OCC and South Oxfordshire District Council have shared residents' concerns, but both councils recently agreed to contribute funds to a 'Strategic Outline Business Case' in order to remain part of the process. OCC has made it clear to the other partners in this piece of work, that the council, by helping to fund this work, is not inherently supporting the scheme and will await the results of this work before taking a position on whether to

support a full business case submission for funding. This decision process will also involve further consultation with the communities the scheme could impact upon. An initial report is due this autumn.

#### SPECIFIC REPORT FOR SHIPLAKE

6. **SIGNAGE ISSUES: FOOTPATHS 7 & 36 AND MILL LANE RESTRICTED BYWAY**

The aggressive unofficial signs to deter walkers have now been removed. The ROW team will be visiting the area in the near future to replace/refresh official signs.

7. **SAFETY ISSUES ON A4155 BETWEEN SHIPLAKE AND SPAN HILL**

The vegetation has now been cut back around various road signs, however the damaged chevrons have still not been replaced, despite a work order having been raised. I have chased officers for an update.

8. **CONSULTATION: P16/S0642/FUL FACTORY AT SHEEPHOUSE FARM**

I have stated I believe the location to be inappropriate for industrial development, especially as the former Wyevale garden centre is available nearby.

9. **P16/S0698/FUL - 'DULVERTON', READING ROAD**

I have expressed my concern to Highways that we are potentially moving from two houses in this dangerous location to five houses. Despite lodging a holding objection due to a technical query, I believe Highways are minded that the development is acceptable.

7. **S.O.D.C. Cllr P Harrison submitted the following report**

1. **Council Leaders propose simplification of local government to support a Devolution Deal for Oxfordshire.**

Five council leaders are proposing a ground-breaking plan that will revolutionise public services in Oxfordshire and neighbouring areas. The plan would see the abolition of Oxfordshire County Council, with its functions transferring to three or four new Local Unitary Councils working together in partnership with the National Health Service, Police and the Local Enterprise Partnerships. These changes would simplify local government in the county and bring about significant savings that could be reinvested in public services.

Oxfordshire District Council Leaders are asking government to agree their plan for the creation of new Local Unitary Councils and to support an ambitious Devolution Deal for Oxfordshire. The devolution deal would bring in significant investment in roads, schools and public transport.

The new proposals introduce joint working with the National Health Service to pool budgets and to commission health and adult social care in a way that improves service quality and deals effectively with increasing demand.

Speaking on behalf of all of the Districts, Cllr Matthew Barber said, "This devolution deal is a fantastic opportunity for Oxfordshire and we believe we should do everything possible to secure much needed investment for the benefit of residents, businesses and communities.

Local Unitary Councils working together through a Combined Authority offer the best solution for the people of Oxfordshire. It will allow decision-making and service delivery to better reflect the different challenges and priorities of the people we serve. It will also build on the District Councils' strong track record of sound financial planning and efficiency that are at the heart of good governance and effective service delivery.

It is important to establish from the outset that we do not support a 'lift, shift and divide' in terms of County Council services as this would simply move financial burdens from one organisation to another. As districts we have spent the past years delivering increasing efficiencies, transforming our services, creating shared teams, adopting flexible structures and a commercial approach. Simply dividing up county council services would not allow us to achieve the transformation needed. We will form new Local Unitary Councils and introduce new models of commissioning and delivery to transform public services for the better."

Dr Joe McManners, Chair of Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group said, "We support the ambition of the councils to bring health and social care closer together as this will improve outcomes for patients. We will wish to work closely with them in developing these plans."

This proposal recognises that greater efficiency and co-ordination is needed than currently exists; for example, better planning for transport and housing delivery, skills development and a more joined up approach to health and social care; would benefit all residents of Oxfordshire. At the heart of the proposals is the creation of a

Combined Authority. This means that Leaders of all councils in Oxfordshire will work together in the interests of their own areas and the county overall. It will also mean better coordination and greater efficiencies for services that need to be delivered across the county.

The Districts are evaluating the options for either three or four new Local Unitary Councils. In view of the successful partnerships and close working relationships that already exist in the north and west of the county the Oxfordshire District Leaders have agreed to explore a Unitary Option that includes both Cotswold District Council and South Northamptonshire Council.

The Councils are now commissioning independent experts to work with them and other stakeholders in producing detailed, costed plans that will ensure the best and most cost-effective solutions are identified. Detailed proposals will be considered by each of the Councils prior to public consultation in the summer.

## **2. Corporate Services Project update**

The five councils are working through the detail of the proposals from Capita and Vinci as the window for challenging these appointments has now passed.

We have the rest of this month to agree any changes to their proposals before officially signing the contracts at the beginning of April.

The two companies recently held introductory briefings with our affected staff and

once the contracts have been signed they'll sit down with them formally to talk through the detail of their proposals and how they will affect them.

## **3. Bins over Easter**

Like every bank holiday, we'll be emptying bins on a different day over Easter. ## **5. Council Tax**

Firstly, when Council met on the 18th February it approved the budget for 2016/2017, which means that, whilst OCC have increased their bill by 3.99% and with a 1.99% rise for the Police and Crime Commissioner, SODC has kept its element of the Council Tax frozen. This has been achieved without cuts to any of our services, which will be maintained at or above their present standards.

Residents will start receiving their council tax bills this month, if they haven't had them already.

## **6. Henley and Harpsden Neighbourhood Plan**

Residents in Henley and Harpsden have voted in favour of adopting their Neighbourhood Plan. In the referendum on Thursday this week, 2,105 people voted in favour of adopting the plan, 471 voted against it. The turnout was just over 28 per cent.

## **7. Its official - South is best for rural dwellers!**

South Oxfordshire has topped a list of the best places to live in the UK countryside.

According to a survey produced by Halifax South Oxfordshire has the highest living standards, with happy residents, high levels of satisfaction and low levels of anxiety.

We also scored highly for health and employment, with 97 per cent of adults saying they were in good health and 81 per cent in jobs.

## **8. Rubbish and Waste**

We're holding a focus group with residents to help us improve our waste collection service. It is happening on Wednesday 23 March.

## **9. Bin stickers**

We've started putting stickers on bins in Abingdon and Didcot to try and address the ongoing problem we're having with recycling being contaminated with food waste and nappies. This is a trial run, and the stickers have our recycling website address on. If people visit the site, they'll see a short message

#### 10. **Grants**

The window for grants is still open, running until 1 April 2016 for decisions by 10 July 2016 and as previously reported, we have made changes to this process to make it easier to apply so we hope that our communities will make full use of this opportunity. — if you know of a local project that could do with a financial boost, tell them to visit our grants page.

The Working Group's first recommendation regarding the Council Tax Reduction Scheme funding has been agreed by the Cabinet, so Town and Parish Council's should soon receive our letter explaining that a Grant is being made available to help support celebrations to mark our Queen's 90th Birthday. Plans for the remaining funds are still being worked on and we expect to announce these shortly.
