

An Amazon scam email is doing the rounds, and it looks like a genuine order confirmation but is ruse to steal your bank details.

One of the scam emails claimed that the victim ordered a vintage chandelier (as shown below). Others include Bose stereos, iPhones, cameras and luxury watches.

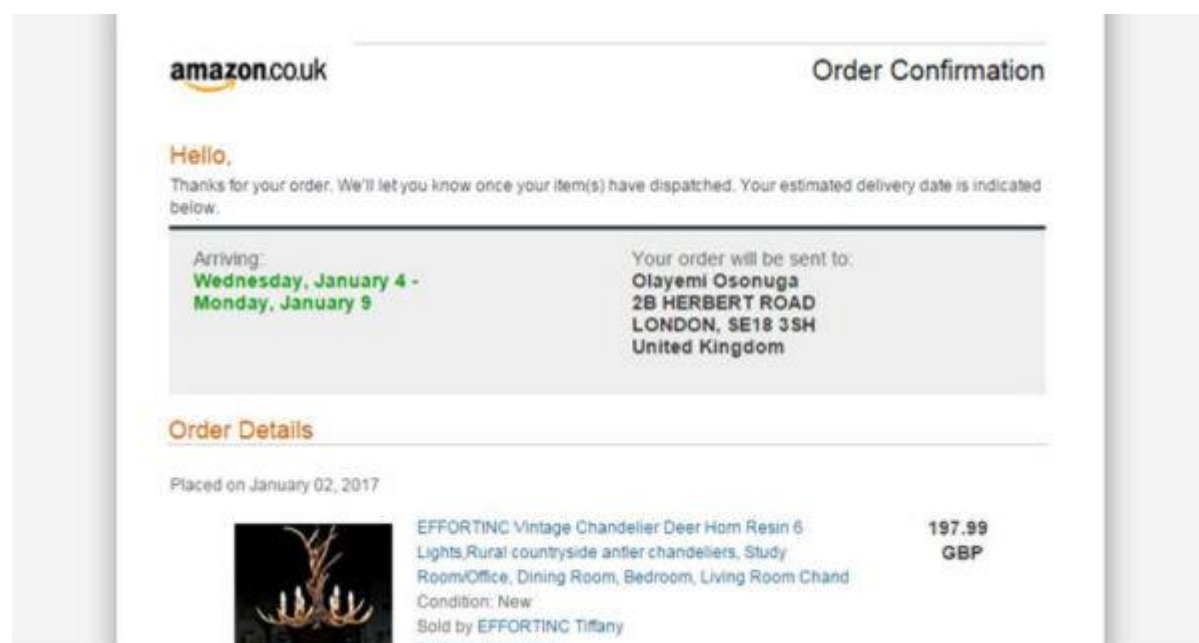

The email says that if you haven't authorised the transaction you can click on a help centre link to get a full refund. The link leads to a perfectly authentic-looking website which asks for your name, address and bank card details.

A man lost £750 after entering his Nationwide bank details. Luckily, he notified the bank soon afterwards and it cancelled the card and refunded him in full.

NOTE: Amazon says that it will never ask you to enter financial information by email. Users of Amazon can easily check their orders by logging into their account on Amazon's website.
